Young leaders debate the intergenerational impact of residential schools, the Holocaust, Japanese internment and the Chinese Head Tax

September 13, 2013 - What are the intergenerational impacts of human rights violations such as the residential schools? What does reconciliation mean? How can we ensure that human rights violations don't continue to happen? Four young leaders will tackle timely questions such as these at a dialogue entitled "Be the Change: Young People Healing the Past and Building the Future" September 18 at the Pacific Coliseum in Vancouver. Co-hosted by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada (TRC) and the Inspirit Foundation, the dialogue is part of the TRC's British Columbia National Event from September 18 to 21, 2013.

Columnist Daphne Bramham from The Vancouver Sun will moderate the dialogue.

Media are invited to attend the event. Interviews with the panelists can be coordinated in the days leading up to the event or immediately after.
